Endotracheal Tube (ETT) Taping Guide

Securing the Endotracheal Tube (ETT) with tape is preferred in most paediatric patients. Here is a guide of how to safely and securely tape an ETT. This task will require at least two staff. Ensure adequate ventilation is provided throughout.



Brown tape



Elastic zinc oxide tape



Hydrocolloid dressing cut to size



Skin protective preperation wipe

*Refer to your local facility for tape type preferences

OR*

PROCEDURE

Wipe above and below the lips and cheeks with barrier wipes. Allow to dry completely.



Place hydrocolloid dressing on the cheek on the same side as the ETT.



Place tape over hydrocolloid dressing and the lower trouser-leg of tape straight below bottom lip.



Wind upper trouser-leg of tape firmly around ETT. Turn tape over to create a tab at the end. Do not tape cuff to ETT.



Place wide end of second tape over the first tape. Secure upper trouser-leg of tape above top lip.



Wind lower trouser-leg of tape firmly around ETT. Turn tape over to create a tab at the end. Do not tape cuff to



Ensure depth of ETT tube is documented and in the patient chart.





ALERT

It is essential that ventilation continues during the taping procedure. This may require additional staff.
