# **Oropharyngeal Airway**

Oropharyngeal airways (OPAs) are used to improve airway patency. They are used in patients where structural airway support is required to optimise ventilation. It helps to keep the tongue from obstruction the airway. They are contraindicated in patients with a gag reflex. Patient who require an OPA require high acuity care. Ensure that a team is gathered to adequately care for the patient.

#### **GATHER EQUIPMENT**



NPAs come in sizes from ooo to 6.

To find the correct size, measure with the estimated OPA from the central incisors to the angle of the jaw.

An incorrectly sized OPA can cause airway obstruction.



Tongue depressor

#### PROCEDURE

Position the child in a way that allows access to the mouth.

Use a tongue depressor to help move the tongue out of the way. Insert the OPA with the concave surface to the tongue under direct vision.

A correctly sized OPA should sit flush.



5

Document the size of OPA used and reassess its effectiveness.





#### **ALERT**

Do not twist, turn or invert the OPA in an infant or child as this can damage their soft palate.

If the patient begins to gag during insertion, remove the OPA.
